Greetings to my brothers and sisters in Christ, our Savior.

I don't know what 2025 was like for you, but we do know that even though we all have a few years of youth, our true development is internal... our inner being is being renewed day by day (2 Corinthians 9:16).

We truly live for ourselves by living for others, showing them that living according to the Truth is the only true love and freedom that the Creator God offers us (John 3:16 and 8:32).

The "modern" world in which we live is invaded by various means of audio-visual communication, but these means of communication do not generate messages by themselves. Since the departure of the apostles, many preachers have tried in good faith to bring Christianity to the world. But the only way to know the truth is to return to the Holy Scriptures. The Holy Scriptures are consulted less and less because people believe that truth inevitably comes through social media and that the Bible is outdated. How then can we have noble sentiments like the Berean Christians? (Acts 17:10,11) Returning to the authority of Scripture is not limited to the new birth itself but encompasses what this new birth entails: living differently (Romans 6:3-14; 12:2). The liberalism that began in the first century, attempting to marry the Church to the world, is and always will be present, not only in religious sects but also within the Lord's Church itself. God and His Word are the only barrier that puts an end to this attempt, which pleases man, but which God has not tolerated in either the Old or New Covenant (Acts 20:26-32).

New things should not obscure the Truth, but the Truth should shed light on everything that is considered modern or cutting-edge technology. (Ecclesiastes 1:9-10).

Regarding work, I had a wonderful surprise at the beginning of the year. A brother I knew from 1992, when he was born in French Guiana, wrote to me from France. He is now in his mid-thirties, an engineer, married, and has a family. He thanked me for the brotherhood we share in the Lord. He is a potential future partner for the Lord's work in French Guiana.

A part of the work in 2025 was devoted to studies and communications with Brother Samdani Basha in India. We sent Brother Roy Knight, a preacher, along with two elders and a deacon from a Church of Christ in Chennai, to visit him. It's a distance of over 400 kilometers. Brother Samdani works in a Muslim community, and Brother Knight told us it's not easy and that he is very courageous. He has baptized several people since then, and his training continues amidst these challenges. We continue to encourage him in this new work while being careful not to skip any steps.

Every Wednesday evening, I lead a study session in Quebec City. In previous years, the group was made up of people from the surrounding area, but now it's multicultural. Many members are from different African countries with diverse backgrounds. It's demanding but interesting.

Members from East Broughton, Thetford Mines, Shawinigan, and Trois-Rivières come to Plessisville every Sunday for the meeting. This saves me hundreds of kilometers that I used to travel.

The greatest work is not becoming a Christian through baptism (which is indeed Christ's work) but living the Christian life through all the difficulties it entails. The greatest work of my life is still through direct or remote encounters (phone, text, email, etc.). Work is a precious treasure (Proverbs 12:27).
